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WEDDING INFORMATION KIT

CONGRATULATIONS ON YOUR ENGAGEMENT!

It should reflect the values you share, the feelings you have for each other, and the important people in your life who have helped you get to where you are. I've been a performer my whole life, and over the years I have sung at, played at, catered for, waited, MC'd, and best-manned too many weddings to count (not to mention my own elaborate countryside wedding)! I have a wealth of knowledge about all types of ceremony, and have seen the very best and worst of everyone's ideas over the years.


The large majority of my career has been spent in music - as a touring singer, MC, educator, workshop facilitator, youth leadership trainer, producer, and manager. I have been producing shows, events, festivals and competitions for the last twenty years, and have a good feel for how to create the right energy for an event.



CEREMONY

Ceremony is important in many ways: Firstly, it provides a solemness to the day, giving you, your friends, and your families a chance to acknowledge the love and support between you. Secondly, it provides formality to you and your guests, to pay respect to the promises you are making. As well as this, these time-honoured ceremonies help to guide our emotional experience through important milestones in our life.

Weddings are slightly different to other types of ceremonies in that they have serious legal implications. Only qualified and registered celebrants or priests can officiate wedding ceremonies, and certain elements of the ceremony are non-negotiable. The following is a basic outline of elements you may (or may not) wish to consider for your ceremony. The items in red are the legal, non-negotiable items that must be included for your marriage to be solemnised in the eyes of the law.





TYPICAL WEDDING OUTLINE

As a bit of a guide, here is a standard outline for your typical ceremony. Only the "Monitum" and "Legal Vows" are essential for a legal marriage, and other parts are regularly added, subtracted or modified as required.

HOUSE KEEPING

A good pre-ceremony opportunity to remind guests about mobile phones, any directions from you about photos and social media, and other important information about the day's schedule, or venue amenities.

PROCESSIONAL

This is where the bridesmaids and bride enter the ceremony, usually accompanied by music.

A brief welcome to guests, an introduction of the celebrant, and explanation of the day's celebrations.



GIVING AWAY

This is where one, or both parents of the bride and / or groom can release their ceremonial custody of their children to each other.

INTRODUCTION

Your celebrant will speak a little about your commitment to one another, what marriage means to you, and some anecdotal accounts of how you met.

READING

Couples often use short readings of poetry, literature, songs, or prayers to enhance their ceremony. It is also a lovely way to include friends or family who aren't otherwise required in the bridal party.



MONITUM * REQUIRED

For the marriage to be legal, the celebrant MUST read the government issued monitum.

THE ASKING

One of the most traditional elements of a wedding ceremony, this is the "I do" bit!

LEGAL VOWS * REQUIRED

These are the words you MUST say in the presence of your witnesses to solemnise your marriage.

PERSONALISED VOWS


Often couples will choose to write their own vowels that more concisely represent their relationship. They are spoken before or after the "Legal Vows".

RING EXCHANGE

The exchange of wedding rings is a classic tradition in Western culture.

PRONOUNCING

This is the part where your celebrant will say, "I now pronounce you husband and wife. You may kiss the bride." This is an important moment within the ceremony - one which seems to delight both the couple and the guests, who are eager to see your first kiss as a married couple.



SIGNING OF THE REGISTER * REQUIRED

The paperwork must be completed by the married couple, plus their two chosen witnesses and the celebrant to finalise the marriage. This is a great time to provide some music for your guests, as it often takes 5-10 minutes to finalise everything, and get the photos you are after.



RITUALS

Some couples may choose to add certain rituals at this point in the ceremony.

CONCLUSION

The conclusion is just a short set of messages that will help bring everyone's focus back to the task at hand. Any house-keeping or instructions about photos or post-ceremony activities should take place here.

BLESSING

A final blessing for the couple, as we all wish you the very best for the future.

PRESENTATION

Traditionally, a couple would be announced before they leave the venue - "May I present Mr and Mrs...". Essentially, the presentation is what prepares people for your departure, and signs off the ceremony.

RECESSIONAL

Often some music is played as the newly-weds exit the space, as they are showered with petals, rice, confetti, or other projectiles.

Your celebrant will often give instructions to your guests as to what happens next - photos, lawn games, nibbles, etc until the reception begins.



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SUGGESTED POEMS / READINGS

Here is a short list of some well-loved, tried and tested material to give you some ideas and guidance should you require it.



SUGGESTED RITUALS

The bride and groom's hands are tied together in an ancient ceremony which dates back to Pagan traditions of the ancient Celts. The wrapping of the cords signify the unity and bond into which the couple are now committing.

Some family members have travelled from overseas to attend:

"When I look around today and see how far and wide everyone has come to support our lovely couple, I'm reminded of how determined love can be. Travelling through time and space, unwavering with distance or inconvenience. May you all continue to love, cherish and honour these strong friendships and family connections for as long as life allows."

The ceremony is a small gathering of less than 20 guests:

"So often in life we are offered the choice between quality and quantity. Thoughts of scarcity frequently make us choose quantity - lest we run out when we're in need. But what I see here today is a gathering of the utmost quality - the closest of friends and family, whose unwavering love and support will carry this young couple through all the challenges that lay ahead in their lives."


A giving away, where both parents will affirm their blessings on the marriage:


Parents: "We do."

Do you promise to love, honour, and care for her through all the days given to you to share?

I promise to always make time for the things that bring us closer together and nurture our love. I promise to always nurture a healthy imagination, and remember your youth and beauty, long after both have departed."



Ring exchange, where both parties will wear a ring

"May the circular shape of these rings be a symbol of your ever-lasting love. Their pure, valuable metals signify the purity of love, and act as a reminder to always protect and cherish the most valuable things in life."

Presentation as husband and wife:

"Family and friends, what greater gift can two people share, than the gift of love? It is with warmth in our hearts that we shall forever remember the immense commitment you have made to each other today. May it forever bring you joy, safety, and an energising sense of duty. Ladies and gentlemen, it is with great pleasure I ask you to welcome Mr and Mrs Smith."
